Message from Jason Brooks, Headteacher:

As the Spring term draws to a close and we get closer to Easter, we reflect on another very busy and rewarding term. I have just finished judging an Easter poster competition for the whole school. The quality of the work is stunning and I am rightly proud of our students in this wonderful school. Students have also been making Easter themed cakes, celebrating a wonderful time of the year.

The learning opportunities afforded to our young people are second to none at Maplewell. High quality learning does not simply happen. It is the result of effective partnerships and commitment between home and school. Our young people have their progress tracked throughout the year, which enables them to achieve favourably compared to their peers in other schools. I have a dedicated and committed team of staff who are all driven to get the very best outcomes for every student in school. They are encouraged to go 'above and beyond', which they invariably do. The rewards are vast, seeing young people make fantastic progress academically, socially and emotionally. They are a truly fantastic team of people.

A number of our students have recently returned from a brilliant residential experience at Walesby Forest, near to Newark. They all had a fantastic time and worked well as a team in supporting each other in a variety of outdoor learning activities. A big thank you to all staff who went on the trip and especially to Mr Hoult for organising and leading the trip. It is not an easy thing to manage and he ensured that all children were very well looked after.

We have started to see further improvements across our beautiful site this year and will continue to do so in the Summer term and beyond. Students will benefit from having some brand new outdoor play equipment, it will be installed during the Easter break between the year 7 Base and the Food room. and will provide students with a great resource for break and lunch times. We will be holding an official opening next term and I will be inviting our special friend, Jodie, from Tesco who was instrumental in Maplewell receiving the funds to purchase the play equipment. She has not been in the best of health recently but will always be welcome in school. Looking further ahead, we are planning to convert our tennis court into a state of the art, multi-use sports area. This will be achieved by installing new boarding, upgrading the lighting and most importantly installing a 3G artificial grass playing surface. It will be a fantastic resource for our young people for PE lessons and at social times. There will also be an extensive painting initiative across the site and a number of classrooms will be refurbished in order to further improve the learning environment for students. There are also future plans to expand our ASD provision and refurbish the changing rooms in the gym.

The visit of the Premier League Trophy caused a great stir amongst our school community. Rarely have I seen such excited faces on a Friday morning amongst staff, students, parents and carers. Everybody had an opportunity to have their photograph taken with the trophy on the day. The event helped to raise money for charity, as did Mrs Huggins, Mr Bradshaw and Mr Handley, who all had some drastic hair cuts during this term! Our students also took part in Red Nose day fund-raising events in addition to contributing to their nominated house charities. It has been a fantastic effort by staff and students alike. We should be proud of having such a caring school community.

Spring is a time of new beginnings, which was particularly relevant when myself and Mr Patterson met Mary Swales, a lovely lady who worked in service at Maplewell in 1939, when it was a private residence. She explained how she helped to prepare food and spent much of her time in one room washing the pots and scrubbing floors. All of this at the age of 14. Our students are extremely lucky to have the opportunity to continue their education until the age of 19 nowadays. Mary was the eldest of 5 and was sent away to work, her wages being posted back home in order to support her family. It reminds us all how fortunate we are these days.

There will be some dedicated revision sessions taking place for year 11 students during the Easter holidays. These have been designed to provide students with that extra boost of confidence as they work towards the completion of their GCSE's. Thank you in advance to all staff who have volunteered to give up their holiday time in order to support our students. We will also be running separate revision days for English and Maths during the first couple of weeks in the Summer term. This is another revision opportunity and parents will be encouraged to drop in for a coffee during both days in order to see how we teach our students at Maplewell and gain tips on helping to support our youngsters during the examination period.

Looking ahead to the Summer term, when the weather is hopefully warmer, it is a good time to remind our students of the high standards that we have set ourselves at Maplewell. I expect to see all students wearing the correct uniform at all times and want students to preserve the highest levels of tolerance of each other. It is our school and we all make the school what it is today, a great place for young people to enjoy their learning.


